As a UNV – Communication Support Officer in the Democratic Governance Unit at UNDP, my scope of work is assisting with designing and development of communication materials such as banners, newsletters and press release which would be used for raising awareness of issues that the projects under Governance Unit working on, such as Justice System Programme (JSP), Timor-Leste National Police Project (PNTL) and Electoral Project. Some other job duties include extracting key information from dense documents for project's research; taking minute of regular unit's meeting and sharing the result to the Country Director of UNDP; writing quarterly report and article for various projects to present their process to the stakeholders.



During my assignment with UNDP, I spent most of the time with Justice the System Programme which aims to make а difference towards providing fair, efficient and accessible justice services for everyone,
