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# The Champa Land

The champa flower, which we also call plumeria, is the national flower of Laos. In this rarely known country, we can find this little white flower everywhere. The 6 months-long UNV assignment in Laos is not only a chance that allows us to work in the United Nations, one of the biggest and most influential organizations in the world. It is also an once-in-a-lifetime experience for us to explore Laos, a country that looks completely different yet so similar to Hong Kong.


### 2) The Weather








## 5) The Simplicity and Slow-Paced Life

## Something Similar...



## UN-Habitat

During my term as a UNV in programme management and communications, I worked for the funding reports and knowledge management tasks of two water infrastructure projects that aims to ensure a clean and steady water supply for the vulnerable communities living in the rural areas.
